

BEAVERTON TEENS LEAD DISTRICT CLIMATE ACTION

With no district-wide climate action plan in Beaverton, Sunset High's Climate Club took matters into their own hands. Fueled by concern for their future and recent passage of the Portland Public School's climate policy, the teens found support from their teacher Mr. Brown and a Beaverton Eco-School Network committee led by Audrey Schaab.

They drafted a well-researched policy that includes energy and resource conservation, renewable power, a shift toward electric school buses, sustainable foods, and hands-on climate solutions practice for students. The policy spells out support for frontline communities and for student mental health challenges from climate change.

Last spring, the group presented their draft policy to the school board, then met with the superintendent. Co-author Alanya Abou-Elmajd (above right) shared, "Our vision is for everyone to treat our home delicately and learn to live sustainably." The group is working with the Eco-School Network committee to gather feedback and refine the policy. Their journey, marked by diligence and a commitment to a sustainable future, is a testament to the power of the youth voice in the climate movement.

THE GREAT TURNING FUELS CHANGEMAKERS

How does a nonprofit with just a few paid staff engage tens of thousands of students? We keep our network of volunteers strong by recharging and reconnecting at the annual changemaker retreat. There, we always find a blend of new skills and ideas, inspiration, and magical moments. This year's magic was the workshop: Into the Great Turning: Reconnecting, Recharging, Recommitting. Crafted with care by Jeanette Swafford and presented by changemakers Kristina Garcia-Seigel and Marissa Emery, the workshop invites us to actively practice hope as we move through our lives.

In the winding path that is a changemaker's journey, the Great Turning is a guiding star. Coined by Joanna Macy, The Great Turning is a shift from the extractive Industrial Growth Society to a life-sustaining civilization where human needs are met while respecting the planet. Millions of people (like those in our network) are doing the work of sustainable living and systems-shifting daily.

At the workshop, we grounded ourselves in nature, reflected, and shared insights. We noticed our climate grief, not as a burden, but as a catalyst for change. We had conversations that connected us with other changemakers, recognizing the power and collective strength created by being present for each other in the Great Turning. At the end, Marissa remarked, "I felt much more hopeful about our collective futures. That hope is a deeply valuable tool." We left the retreat not just recharged but with hearts full and hope ablaze – for another year of changemaking.



TRASH BUSTING FOR GREEN, CLEAN SCHOOLS



In recent years, school trash troubles have become a barrier to outdoor learning and a danger on walk and bike paths. In the saga of battling the litter, graffiti, and sharps invading school-yards, Eco-School Network changemakers and students emerged as superheroes, armed not with capes but with trash grabbers and dedication to a clean, safe environment.

A league of parent volunteers planned clean-ups and related improvements at 18 schools serving low-income families, motivating thousands of kids, families, and neighbors to clean up 43 blocks, schoolyards and school walk and bike routes. With support from Metro's Regional Refresh Fund and in partnership with AdoptOneBlock, our Network lent out "clean-up kits" with all the trash bags, gloves, and graffiti-busting potions needed.

Beyond the aesthetic impact, the project connected communities and empowered even the littlest students as stewards. One parent testified, "It was amazing how it helped kids gain a sense of pride and ownership, a work ethic, and interest in helping with upkeep." Some schools even started daily clean-ups, with mini eco-warriors on a high-suspense recess hunt for ever-more-elusive trash bits – reaching their grabbers through fences and storm drains while learning the joy of making their space safer, cleaner, and fit for wildlife.

IVY VS. IMAGINATION

At North Clackamas' Seth Lewelling Elementary, an inventive changemaker named Heather Lane orchestrated an ambitious outdoor makeover with students. They envisioned a healthier, cleaner schoolyard ecosystem and more beautiful space, but the invasive English Ivy taking over the schoolyard was staggering and litter didn't help. After learning that only vertically growing ivy could sow seeds, they decided to start by removing the ivy clinging to trees.

Heather put out the word, and staff, families, and neighbors came to pitch in. Still recovering from pandemic isolation, wrestling 900 pounds of ivy off the trees turned out to be just the thing to build and strengthen bonds between friends new and old. The clean-up was one of the most successful school events ever, based on attendance and impact.

Parents and staff also wanted to make the expansive exterior school wall blend in with the environment. Their solution? A vibrant nature mural! Heather sends a heartfelt shoutout to the Metro Refresh Fund and Portland Street Art Alliance for supporting this project with Eco-School Network. As ivy bows out, imagination, community, and native wildlife can now take center stage.

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ALL-SCHOOL GREEN TEAM BRIDGES CULTURE

You've heard of student green teams and school work parties — but what about adding harp music, Peruvian dancing, and a commitment to turn the whole body into a giant green team? That's just what Portland's Ainsworth Elementary has done. Covid halted school composting, and the restart was slow, with student skills being rusty. So Eco-School Network Changemakers Vera Klebleeva, Pam Stekly, and Kristen Morgan made a plan. At the school Earth Day Celebration, with 250 participants and flamenco dancers, they arranged for Principal Johnson to call on all students to become better stewards, bestowing a new title on them: they are now Ainsworth Earth Defenders, or Defensores de Tierra in Spanish. He even texted all families the call to action.

The cafeteria impact was immediate. Students clambored for a role as lunch waste sorting monitors. Classes that sorted carefully won pajama days! The Custodian Alfonso "Jojo" Arboleda was key to the program's success. Staff and teachers have buy-in, lunchroom signs celebrate Earth Defenders, and sustainability is now part of mealtime culture.

To welcome diverse families into greening efforts, the Green Team planned a unique "Culture Meets Nature" series of work parties. "We're cleaning ivy and restoring native plants. We're all living on the same planet. All cultures respect and celebrate the Earth," says Vera Klebleeva, changemaker and team co-chair. "With half the students in the Spanish-immersion program, all our events are about bringing the community together." Parents and students work for an hour, then learn how Earth is celebrated in a different culture each time through music, dance or art—like Pacha-Mamá wooden miniature structures.

Over 100 native trilliums bloomed on school grounds thanks to their ivy clearing! They've built a culture of sustainability from the bottom-up and top-down. Their efforts are making Earthcare fun for everyone.
