Recycling Plastics

Why we care

Dealing with plastic waste is a conundrum. Some of it is recyclable curbside; some can be transported to a depot; and some must go into the trash.

- Recyclable curbside: bottles, tubs, rigid plant pots (at least 4"), buckets (no more than 5 gallons)
- Recyclable at depots: bags, clamshells, boxes, trays, lids
- Trash: Styrofoam and other plastic packaging with no number (inside chasing arrows) on the bottom

Simple, positive change

- 1. Prevent waste in the first place:
 - Avoid buying products that come in plastic that cannot be recycled curbside. Purchase meat at a counter and request paper wrap. .
 - When you can't, leave packaging in the store and tell sales clerk why you are doing so. Return block styrofoam to the store.
 - Choose restaurants and cafeterias that use durable dishes. Take your own containers for take-out food or join <u>Go Box</u>.
- 2. If plastic packaging is not acceptable curbside but it has **number on the bottom or is a lid**, deliver it to Far West Fibers (503-643-9944). According to experts, for every five pounds of plastic recycled, you could **drive eight miles (round trip) to a depot and still save energy**!

3. Note that styrofoam is no longer accepted at the depots. Call Metro at 503-234-3000, or check Find a Recycler.
